Core Idea

Okay, real talk — I watched a Korean drama and every other line was just 어? 응? 왜? and I had no idea what any of them meant.

Right? They all sound like little grunts to me. Are they even real words, or just noises?

They are real words. Very small, but very important. 오늘의 핵심은 이 세 개예요. In English, today's core is exactly these three.

The secret is pitch. Each one goes up at the end — that rising sound turns it into a reaction or a question.

Conversation Snapshot

Speaker	Korean	Meaning
Hana	어? 이거 네 커피야? —	Oh? Is this your coffee?
Junho	응? 뭐라고? —	Huh? What did you say?



Speaker	Korean	Meaning
Hana	이 커피, 네 거냐고. —	This coffee — I asked if it's yours.
Junho	아, 응. 내 거야. —	Ah, yeah. It's mine.
Junho	나 이사 가. —	I'm moving.
Hana	어? 갑자기? —	Oh? Suddenly?
Hana	왜? 무슨 일 있어? —	Why? Is something going on?

Vocabulary & Useful Expressions

Word	Meaning	Example
한 음절, 큰 의미 han eumjeol, keun uimi	One syllable, big meaning	완벽해요. That's exactly it. In English you'd use whole phrases — Korean does it in one breath.
끝을 올려요 ↗ kkeuteul ollyeoyo	Lift the end ↗	Nice. One correction for both of you — don't let the pitch fall at the end. A flat 응 becomes 'yeah,' and flat 어 sounds like you're just thinking, not surprised.



Grammar / Structure Notes

어? / 응? / 왜?

어? / 응? / 왜? — Oh? / Huh? / Why? (What?)

Tiny reactions that carry a lot of feeling.

↗ 어? ↗ 응? ↗ 왜?

↗ 어? ↗ 응? ↗ 왜? — Rising pitch = surprise, checking, or reacting

Same syllable, flat vs. rising, changes the meaning.

어?

어 + ? — Oh? / Huh? — surprise, something unexpected

First one. 어? with a rising pitch means surprise — like English 'Oh?' or 'Wait, what?' 뭔가 예상 못 했을 때 써요.

어? 내 열쇠...

어? 내 열쇠... — Huh? My keys...

어? = the sound of noticing.

응?

응 + ? — Huh? / What was that? — please repeat

Second one. 응? means 'Huh? Say that again.' You didn't catch what someone said. 잘 못 들었을 때예요.
